Discussion was held on an Ordinance for restaurant liquor licenses and a moratorium on the issuing liquor or malt beverage licenses as the county is the entity that would issue licenses. When the moratorium is lifted, the County could consider issuing liquor licenses, and discussed that the County could approve a policy that required applicants to get approval from the Tribe first.

Motion by Kehn, seconded by Diaz, to approve a resolution as follows to establish a moratorium on the issuance of liquor licenses. With no further discussion and all voting yes, the motion carried.

#### SHANNON COUNTY RESOLUTION #2014-04

WHEREAS Shannon County is a political subdivision of the State of South Dakota organized under a home rule charter; and

WHEREAS Shannon County has encompassed within its boundaries the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, an Oglala Lakota Native American Reservation, that encompasses the entirety of Shannon County; and

WHEREAS the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation was originally part of the Great Sioux Reservation established by the Ft. Laramie Treaty of 1868; and

WHEREAS a law passed by Congress in 1832 banned the sale of alcohol to Native Americans; and

WHEREAS the ban of sale of alcohol to Native Americans was ended in 1953 by Public Law 277, signed by President Dwight D. Eisenhower, which law gave Native American's the option of permitting or banning alcohol sales and consumption on their lands; and

WHEREAS the Oglala Sioux Tribe chose to exclude alcohol on the Reservation after the enactment of Public Law 277; and

WHEREAS since 1999, activists from the Pine Ridge Reservation, the America Indian Movement and Nebraskans for Peace, have worked to have beer sales shut down in nearby White Clay, Nebraska, a border town selling alcohol annually to residents on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation where alcohol consumption is prohibited; and

WHEREAS in 2004, the Oglala Sioux Tribe voted down a referendum to legalize alcohol sales; and

WHEREAS in 2006, the Oglala Sioux Tribal Council voted to maintain the ban on alcohol sales; and

WHEREAS voters, in an election by the Oglala Sioux Tribe on August 14, 2013 voted to end prohibition and legalize alcohol on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation; and

WHEREAS the Shannon County Commission believes the sale of alcohol within the boundaries of Shannon County will increase rates of crime, poverty and other issues; and

WHEREAS the Shannon County Commission acknowledges the negative impacts that accompany the growth of liquor licenses within its boundaries; and

WHEREAS the Shannon County Commission believes it would be a positive step in placing a moratorium on the issuance of liquor licenses within its boundaries to enable it an opportunity to successfully utilize tools to prepare for the issuance of liquor licenses within Shannon County; and

WHEREAS a moratorium on issuing liquor licenses would not affect any incumbent businesses within the boundaries of Shannon County,

Therefore be it RESOLVED that a temporary moratorium on the issuance of alcohol licenses within the boundaries of Shannon County shall become effective January 1, 2014; and it is further

RESOLVED that no person, business entity or governmental agency shall be entitled to any license relative to the establishment of bars, packaged liquor stores, grocery stores, or restaurants and that no person, business entity or governmental entity shall be entitled to the issuance of an alcoholic beverage license within the boundaries of Shannon County; and it is further

RESOLVED that this Resolution shall remain in effect for 1 year from January 1, 2014 or until such a time as the Shannon County Commissioners deem that sufficient safeguards have been put in place to address the affects of issuing licenses for the sale of alcoholic beverages on the potential increase in crime, increase in poverty and the affect on Social Welfare agencies and families affected by the development of establishments within the boundaries of Shannon County to sell alcoholic beverages.

The first reading of an ordinance establishing restaurant liquor licenses was held. Motion by Kehn, seconded by Hutchison, to approve the first reading of Ordinance #2014-01 as follows.

# SHANNON COUNTY ORDINANCE #2014-01 AN ORDINANCE CREATING AN ON-SALE LICENSE FOR ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES FOR FULL-SERVICE RESTAURANTS

Section 1. Full-Service On-Sale Restaurant License: The terms used in this section mean:

- 1. "Bar": any permanently installed counter within the restaurant area from which alcoholic beverages are regularly served to customers by a person who is tending bar or drawing or mixing alcoholic beverages.
- "Full-service restaurant": any restaurant at which a waiter or waitress delivers food and drink offered from a printed food menu to patrons at tables, booths or the bar. Any restaurant that only serves fry orders of foodstuffs such as sandwiches, hamburgers or salads is not a full-service restaurant.

- 3. "Restaurant": any area in a building maintained, advertised and held out to the public as a place where individually priced meals are prepared and served primarily for consumption in such area and where at least sixty percent of the gross revenue of the restaurant is derived from the sale of food and nonalcoholic beverages. The restaurant shall have a dining room or rooms, a kitchen and the number and kinds of employees necessary for the preparing, cooking, and servicing of meals. Source: Statutory Authority; SDCL 35-4-110.
- 4. "Current Fair Market Value": the documented price of the on-sale license most recently sold between January 1, 2003 and January 1, 2008, through an arm's length transaction, less the value of any real or personal property included with the transaction. Source: Statutory Authority; SDCL 35-4-117.

<u>Section 2. Documentation in Support of Initial Application for Full-Service Restaurant On-Sale</u> <u>License.</u> An applicant for a full-service restaurant on-sale license shall provide sufficient documentation to the governing body upon an application form provided by the County to prove that the primary source of revenue from the operation of the restaurant will be derived from the sale of prepared food and nonalcoholic beverages and not from the sale of alcoholic beverages. The supporting documentation concerning the primary source of revenue submitted pursuant to this section is confidential. Source: Statutory Authority; SDCL 35-4-112.

<u>Section 3. Renewal of Full-Service Restaurant On-Sale License – Annual Report.</u> The full-service restaurant licensee shall submit on forms provided by the County an annual report. Forms shall include an oath verifying the validity of the information provided in the report. The report and the supporting documentation submitted pursuant to this section are confidential. The report shall include the annual gross sales of the license for the following two categories:

- 1. Food and nonalcoholic beverage sales.
- 2. Total Gross Revenues

Source: Statutory Authority; SDCL 35-4-113

<u>Section 4. Conditions of Renewal</u>. When renewing a full-service restaurant on-sale license, the County shall condition the license renewal upon documents that at least sixty percent of gross revenue from the preceding twelve months operation of the full-service restaurant was derived from the sale of food and nonalcoholic beverages. Source: Statutory Authority; SDCL 35-4-114.

<u>Section 5. On-Premises Consumption Required.</u> A full-service restaurant on-sale license may only serve alcoholic beverages for on-premise consumption in the bar and dining room area of the restaurant. Source: Statutory Authority; SDCL 35-4-114.

<u>Section 6. Advertisement of Full-Service Restaurant.</u> No licensee that has a full-service restaurant on-sale license may allow smoking on the licensed premises. A restaurant that has a full-service restaurant on-sale license may only be advertised or held out to the public as primarily a food eating establishment. Source: Statutory Authority; SDCL 35-4-115.

<u>Section 7. Certain Licensees to Report Amount Paid for Other Licenses.</u> The license fee charge for a full-service restaurant on-sale license shall be at or above the current fair market value for such license as determined herein. However, any fair market value so established shall be a minimum of one dollar for each person residing within the County as measured by the last preceding decennial federal census.

1. The license fee shall be initially established by Resolution of the County Commissioners within ninety days of the adoption of Ordinance #2014-01. Subsequent changes to the

license fee shall not be made for a period of ten (10) years from the effective date of Ordinance #2014-01 unless a growth in population reported by the federal decennial census requires an increase to the fee.

2. Within 90 days of the effective date of Ordinance #2014-01, each licensee within the County who owns an on-sale license pursuant to SDCL 35-4-2(4) and (6) as of January 1, 2008, and who purchased the license or had the license transferred to such licensee at any time between January 1, 2003 and January 1, 2008, shall report the amount originally paid for the on-sale license to the County Auditor on forms provided by the County. Any form submitted pursuant to this provision shall be signed under oath and shall include the documents establishing the amount originally paid for the on-sale license. If the transaction for the purchase of the on-sale license included real or personal property, the full market value of the real or personal property on the date of the original sale shall be deducted from the total transaction price to determine the amount paid by the license for the on-sale license. The burden of establishing the amount paid for the license shall be on the licensee. Any license contesting the fair market value of the license on the date of purchase may file an objection to the report. The objection shall be filed with the County within thirty days of the date the license fee is set. The determination of the governing board may be appealed to the circuit court. Source: Statutory Authority; SDCL 35-4-117.

<u>Section 8. Registration that Full-Service Restaurant On-Sale License is for Sale.</u> The County shall maintain a registry of each full-service on-sale restaurant license that is being offered for sale and the County shall furnish a copy of the registry to anyone who requests a new full-service restaurant on-sale license. The existing full-service restaurant on-sale license is responsible for registering with the County that the full-service restaurant on-sale license is for sale. Source: Statutory Authority; SDCL 35-4-117.

<u>Section 9. Registry of Full-Service Restaurant On-Sale Licenses.</u> The County may only issue a new license under this action if no on-sale license is on the registry or a person desiring to purchase an on-sale license listed on the registry provides documentation showing that the person is unable to purchase the on-sale license at the price established in Section Seven of this Ordinance and on terms satisfactory to both the potential buyer and seller. The price of any on-sale license registered with the County under this Ordinance shall be sold at the current fair market price set by the County Commission pursuant to the Resolution adopted in accordance with Section Seven of the Ordinance. Source: Statutory Authority; SDCL 35-4-118.

The Board requested Mel Engebretson, Register of Deeds, report to them when fee lands are transferred into tribal trust. A delinquent tax listing was requested for the next meeting and the amount of school versus county taxes payable for the current year was questioned.

Discussion was held on proposed 2014 legislation that would address emergency cash needs.
