### OGLALA LAKOTA COUNTY UNAPPROVED MINUTES OF SEPTEMBER 8, 2023

The Oglala Lakota Board of County Commissioners met in regular session on September 8, 2023. Present: Allyssa Comer, Art Hopkins, Wendell Yellow Bull by telephone and Sue Ganje, Auditor. Absent: Ramon Bear Runner and Anna Takes the Shield (Dubray).

The Pledge of Allegiance was given and meeting was called to order at 1:30 p.m. by Allyssa Comer, Vice-Chairwoman. The agenda was reviewed for conflicts. ALL MOTIONS RECORDED IN THESE MINUTES WERE PASSED BY UNANIMOUS VOTE, UNLESS OTHERWISE STATED.

Motion made by Yellow Bull, seconded by Hopkins, to approve the agenda.

Motion made by Hopkins, seconded by Yellow Bull, to approve the meeting minutes from August 9, 2023.

Lynx Bettelyoun, Highway Superintendent, met with the Board to present cost estimate for a new Highway Shop from Cleary Building Corp. The estimate is \$352,801.00. He noted that the estimate did not include any concrete, insulation, utility or finishing costs. He spoke with Mark Donovan, Batesland Mayor, to see if the town had any planning and zoning, which they do not. There's a possibility that the street next to the shop could be vacated and utilized as well. Hopkins requested that Bettelyoun make sure that there are exhaust fans included in the building plans.

Bettelyoun inspected Grass Creek Road and determined that it would cost a lot to get the road up to County standards as well as to maintain it. His recommendation is to not take it on as part of the County Highway system. He spoke with the Tribe. They indicated that they have intentions of doing something with the road.

Highway Department updates included notifying the Board that there is a full crew, and everyone is doing great. There are no equipment concerns at the moment. They have been reshaping, refencing, blading, filling in holes and mowing.

Yellow Bull entered the meeting in person at 1:48 pm.

Bear Runner entered the meeting at 1:49 pm.

Bettelyoun repeated some of the previously stated information for the Board members that had just joined the meeting. Yellow Bull recommended contacting the SD School of Mines & Technology to assist with the Highway shop planning.

Jerlene Arredondo, Veteran Service Officer, met with the Board to present her report. She asked the Board for guidance on whether to use a "flex time" system to better accommodate Veterans that need to have later appointment times. The Board agreed that she should do that so that she can be available when needed. Arredondo went over some of the benefits that the Lakota Federal Credit Union is offering for Veterans. There has been some trouble with the headstone deliveries. Many are delivered broken. She contacted the Federal agency that oversees this, they stated that they are going to be utilizing a different trucking company in the future. Hopkins requested that she reach out to the newspapers and radio stations to provide information to Veterans regarding different benefits that are

available. Bear Runner invited her to come during the Housing Authority's radio time slot on Wednesdays at 9 am. She also wanted to discuss concerns that she had regarding the VA Suicide Prevention Hotline and/or the 988 hotline's procedures within the Tribal communities. She discussed the issue with the Hotline, who questioned the procedure of the Tribal Police. They met with the Tribal Chief of Police and spoke to him about Critical Incident training to better assist the individuals that are reaching out for help. He stated that he needs to provide that training to his Officers. Lastly, she reported that she is working on getting a Veterans' Day Ceremony honoring 90+ year old Veterans set up at Prairie Wind Casino. Hopkins and Yellow Bull want to see the County VSO giving coffee, cake, etc. at Veteran's wakes, to be taken out of the supply budget.

Bear Runner left the meeting at 2:33 pm and returned at 2:43 pm.

The Board also reviewed the VSO report. Motion made by Yellow Bull, seconded by Hopkins, to accept the VSO report for August 2023 and place on file.

Motion made by Yellow Bull, seconded by Hopkins, to deny the Zuya Akicita Veterans request for funding to attend the Crow Creek Powwow in Fort Thompson and the Rosebud Powwow in Rosebud. The Board wants a letter sent to groups to notify them that they need to request funding well in advance of the event(s) and would need to be present at the Commission Meeting to present their request.

Anna Takes the Shield (Dubray), joined the meeting at 2:52 pm and took over the meeting as Chairwoman.

TJ Plume of Plume, Inc., Alpha One Fire and Rescue, met with the Board to request funding in the amount of \$19,050.00 to supplement the department's budget to purchase equipment. He read a letter that was placed on file in the Auditor's Office, he went on to say that, due to having an MOA with the Tribe that the department is unable to get certified by the SD Fire Marshall and therefore cannot get any insurance monies allocated to fire departments. Discussion followed regarding other amounts.

Motion made by Yellow Bull, seconded by Hopkins, to give Plume, Inc., Alpha One Fire and Rescue \$5,000.00. The money is to be part of Resolution 2023-07, limiting funding.

Takes the Shield (Dubray) wants a meeting set up and wishes to attend, with Alpha One and the SD Fire Marshall to try and get things resolved so that they may become certified.

Sam Kipp, Deputy Director of Equalization, met with the Board to present quotes from Vanguard for purchasing additional training time.

Motion made by Yellow Bull, seconded by Comer, to purchase 8 hours of training time from Vanguard at a cost of \$1,320.00.

Teresa Pullen, Treasurer, met with the Board to ask that the discussion regarding Delinquent Property Tax payment plans be moved to the next meeting. The Board agreed.

Bear Runner again addressed the Board to speak on behalf of the Oglala Lakota Housing Authority (OLHA) and Behavior Management Systems (BMS) regarding the proposal to assist the

OLHA. They will be requesting that the County contribute \$100,000.00 for the first year to help get things started. Bear Runner passed the presentation out to the Board, only for them to look at before the next meeting. No action was called for.

Break was taken at 3:25 pm. The meeting resumed at 3:45 pm, with Hopkins absent.

Sue Ganje, Auditor, met with the Board to review the 2024 budget. The Board asked that the budget be moved to a time after the Sheriff's presentation.

Hopkins returned to the meeting at 3:50 pm.

Vanessa Plume, Sheriff, met with the Board to present a quote from Liberty Superstores for 3 Dodge 2024 AWD Pursuit Durango's with 5.7 Hemi engines. Discussion regarding the number of vehicles to purchase continued.

Motion made by Yellow Bull, seconded by Hopkins, to purchase 2 new vehicles at a cost of \$52,280.00 each off of the State bid, totaling \$101,480.00.

The Memorandum of Agreement between Prairie Wind Casino of the Oglala Sioux Tribe on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation and Oglala Lakota County was not signed yet by the Tribe, so no action was taken.


